Honorary Degree Recipients

Samuel Waxman, M.D

Honorary Doctor of Science

Samuel Waxman, M.D., is the founder and CEO of the Samuel Waxman Cancer Research Foundation. A 1963 summa cum laude graduate of Downstate's College of Medicine, Dr. Waxman is a nationally and internationally recognized oncologist who has made numerous significant contributions to cancer research. Dr. Waxman has dedicated his career to developing minimally toxic therapies that improve the lives of cancer survivors. His impact extends through his own research and the work of scientists he has funded, both in the United States and around the world.

In his academic role, Dr. Waxman is Professor Emeritus at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai Medical Center. He also serves on the International Scientific Advisory Board of the Shanghai Center for Translational Medicine at Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

Dr. Waxman's pioneering research has led to crucial advancements in understanding how cancer cells differentiate and metastasize. He has explored the role of nutritional factors like vitamins B12, folic acid, and vitamin A in DNA synthesis, contributing to the breakthrough cure for acute promyelocytic leukemia (APL). This once-fatal leukemia now boasts a 95 percent survival rate thanks to these findings.

Continuing his trailblazing work, Dr. Waxman investigates potential treatments for leukemia using arsenic trioxide and retinoids and develops innovative therapies for breast cancer by targeting molecules that drive cancer growth.

Founded by Dr. Waxman in 1976, the Samuel Waxman Cancer Research Foundation (SWCRF) fosters collaboration among global scientists to accelerate cancer cures. Under his guidance, the foundation has invested over \$100 million in cancer research, funding more than 200 scientists worldwide. These investments have led to significant cancer treatment breakthroughs and innovative therapeutic strategies.

The SWCRF champions a unique research model that emphasizes cross-institutional cooperation through its Institute Without Walls, which connects over 60 scientists globally. This network facilitates the exchange of research findings and technologies, speeding up the progress in cancer research.

The foundation not only supports cutting-edge research but also holds special meetings to disseminate research progress among key stakeholders. It has made numerous notable contributions, including developing differentiation therapy for APL and identifying dormant cancer cells critical for understanding metastasis.

Recently, SWCRF has focused on the link between aging and cancer, addressing the increasing global cancer burden due to rising life expectancies. This initiative includes collaborations with prominent research and funding organizations and launching the peer-reviewed journal Aging AND Cancer to spotlight underfunded areas of cancer research related to aging.

Through these multifaceted efforts, Dr. Waxman and the SWCRF continue to lead in the quest to understand and effectively treat cancer, emphasizing minimally toxic treatments to enhance the quality of life for cancer survivors worldwide.

Dr. Waxman has authored more than 300 scientific papers. He has contributed to chapters in textbooks on hematology, chemotherapy, and nutrition and written a series of books focusing on differentiation therapy and leukemia. Dr. Waxman helped found the International Conference on the Differentiation Therapy of Cancer, which brings together researchers from around the globe every two years.

Dr. Waxman's achievements have been recognized with numerous honors and awards. Most recently, these include the Friendship National award from the government of China, The Ellis Island Medal of Honor, the Jacobi medallion from the Ichan school of medicine at Mount Sinai, and an honorary doctorate from Hainan medical university.

M. Roy Wilson, M.D., M.S.

Honorary Doctor of Science

M. Roy Wilson, M.D., M.S., is an inspirational role model and distinguished leader whose contributions to academic medicine, public health, and education have been transformative. He is passionately dedicated to social equity and helping economically disadvantaged students find opportunities through education. His vision and leadership have been instrumental in driving innovation and advancing the educational excellence and research capabilities at the institutions he has led.

Dr. Wilson earned a B.S. in biology from Allegheny College in 1976, followed by an M.D. from Harvard Medical School in 1980, and an M.S. in Epidemiology from the University of California, Los Angeles, in 1990. His training includes an internship in Internal Medicine at Harlem Hospital and a residency in Ophthalmology at the Massachusetts Eye & Ear Infirmary, where he also completed a fellowship in Glaucoma. He is an accomplished ophthalmologist with significant contributions to understanding and treating glaucoma, particularly among underserved populations.

Throughout his career, Dr. Wilson has held prestigious academic appointments. He has been the Chancellor of the University of Colorado Denver and Health Sciences Center, where he also served as chair of the Board of Directors of the University of Colorado Hospital, President of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, and President of Wayne State University (WSU) in Detroit, Michigan (2013 – 2023). He currently serves as President Emeritus and Distinguished Professor of Ophthalmology at WSU. Dr. Wilson also held the position of dean of the School of Medicine at Creighton University and dean of the medical school, president, and chair of the board of directors at Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science.

Dr. Wilson's leadership at WSU was transformative and addressed crucial challenges such as significant racial achievement gaps and declining research funding. Under his guidance, WSU saw a 21-point improvement in graduation rates in five years, an achievement for which it received the prestigious Degree Completion Award from the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities, and a doubling of its research portfolio.

Before his tenure at Wayne State, Dr. Wilson served as the deputy director for strategic scientific planning and program coordination at the National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities. In this role, he pioneered an integrated approach to minority health and health disparities research across the multiple divisions of the National Institutes of Health.

Dr. Wilson's advocacy for diversity and inclusion is highlighted by his tenure as the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) in 2017-2018. Dr. Wilson is a member of both the National Academy of Medicine and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He was a member of the National Academies of Science, Engineering, and Medicine committee that produced the seminal 2023 report on antiracism and equity in STEMM organizations and currently chairs the National Academies committee on the Use of Race and Ethnicity in Biomedical Research.

His contributions to medicine, medical education, science, and equity have earned Dr. Wilson numerous awards, including the National Institutes of Health Director's Award, the AAMC's Herbert W. Nickens Award, and the Michiganian of the Year Award in 2022.

The challenges Dr. Wilson faced growing up as a bi-racial child of a Japanese mother and an African-American U.S. serviceman in Japan are detailed in his memoir, "The Plum Tree Blossoms Even in Winter." His personal journey, marked by resilience and perseverance, continues to inspire and motivate those facing adversity.



Dara Kass, M.D.

Emergency Medicine Physician Healthcare Strategist & Communicator

Dara Kass, M.D., is a distinguished emergency medicine physician and, most recently, was a Biden Administration appointee as Region II Regional Director in the United States Department of Health & Human Services. Prior to that, she was an Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine at Columbia University Medical Center.

A proud Brooklyn native, Dr. Kass's journey into medicine was influenced by her mother, an emergency medicine nurse. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in neurobiology and physiology from the University of Maryland, College Park, before completing her Doctor of Medicine degree at SUNY Downstate's College of Medicine.

Following her residency at SUNY Downstate and Kings County Hospital, Dr. Kass became an attending physician at Staten Island University Hospital, where she helped start their emergency medicine residency program. She joined NYU Langone Medical Center in 2012 as the Director of Undergraduate Medical Education, directing medical school programs in the emergency department. In 2018, Dr. Kass moved uptown to Columbia University Medical Center as an Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine and the inaugural Director of Equity and Inclusion in their Emergency Department.

Early in the COVID-19 pandemic, Dr. Kass contracted the virus, which led her to advocate for frontline healthcare workers' access to personal protective equipment and effective disease control measures. She continued to raise awareness of the pandemic's severity and its impact on healthcare workers' well-being, embracing telemedicine to consult with patients during her recovery.

A strategic consultant and healthcare communicator, Dr. Kass is also the founder of FemInEM, a platform dedicated to promoting gender equity in emergency medicine. FemInEM provides professional development, resources, and support for women in the field—growing from a blog created to share resources to a multimedia organization hosting multiple in-person conferences, a job board, a Speaker's Bureau, and asynchronous resources for gender equity education.

A mother of three, Dr. Kass's journey took an unexpected turn when her youngest son, Sammy, was diagnosed with alpha-I antitrypsin deficiency, causing liver failure and requiring a liver transplant on his second birthday. Dr. Kass served as Sammy's living donor and sparked her advocacy for reforming organ donation policies to increase access to life-saving transplants. Dr. Kass's leadership extends to her involvement in nonprofit organizations that address public health issues like gun violence, organ donation, and access to reproductive health care.

Dr. Kass has received prestigious awards, including the 45under45 Award from the Emergency Medicine Residents' Association and the Advancement of Women in Academic Emergency Medicine Award from the Society for Academic Emergency Medicine.

As Dr. Kass prepares to address the graduating class, her remarkable journey as a physician, advocate, and leader serves as an inspiration to all, embodying the resilience and commitment needed to effect meaningful change in healthcare and beyond.

SUNY Downstate Health Sciences University

SUNY Downstate Health Sciences University is one of four academic health science centers within the 64-unit State University of New York. SUNY Downstate includes the College of Medicine, School of Graduate Studies, College of Nursing, School of Health Professions, School of Public Health, a major research center, several biotechnology sites, and University Hospital at Downstate.

The year 2023 marks the 164th anniversary of SUNY Downstate's emergence as a leader in American medical education. In 1860, the Collegiate Division of the Long Island College Hospital (as it was then known) first opened its doors to students. The school revolutionized medicine in the United States: for the first time in this country, the teaching of medicine was brought to the hospital bedside and the idea that physicians should be trained exclusively in university classrooms and lecture halls was rejected.

In 1931, the school was rechartered as the Long Island College of Medicine. The "Downstate" era began on April 5, 1950, when a merger contract was signed between the Long Island College of Medicine and the newly constituted State University of New York. Several years later, Downstate's current flagship campus was built in East Flatbush, Brooklyn. In April 1953, ground was broken for the Basic Sciences Building, and President Dwight D. Eisenhower laid the cornerstone in 1954. The complex was expanded in 1966 with the opening of University Hospital at Downstate, the School of Health Professions, and the College of Nursing. The School of Public Health was established in 2009. In 2019, Downstate's name was

officially changed to SUNY Downstate Health Sciences University, to more accurately capture the total breadth of the institution's contributions to higher education, scholarship, workforce development, and healthcare.

Today, SUNY Downstate is the focal point of a health education network that encompasses numerous healthcare sites. It offers students broad professional education opportunities, especially for those committed to combating the spread of disease and eliminating health disparities in urban and underserved communities. It plays an important role, nationally and regionally, in the physician and healthcare-professional supply chain. The College of Medicine ranks fourth among the nation's 157 accredited medical schools in the number of graduates who hold an active license to practice medicine and is the top producer of physicians in New York State and New York City.

Downstate faculty members were the first to produce full-body human images using magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) and the first to successfully perform open-heart surgery in New York State. We were the first to establish a federally funded dialysis clinic in the United States, prove that alcoholism has a genetic link, conduct a federal study of perinatal transmission of HIV disease, and identify the important role that nitric oxide plays in cardiovascular health.

This last discovery led to the award of the 1998 Nobel Prize for Medicine or Physiology to the late Downstate faculty member Dr. Robert F. Furchgott.

Land Acknowledgment

We recognize that the venue in which we are celebrating sits on the traditional homelands of the people of the Lenape. The land is both seized and occupied territory of the Lenape People. We honor the Indigenous caretakers of these lands and waters, the elders who lived here before, the Indigenous today, and the generations

The Academic Procession

The procession is led by the presiding marshal. Other members of the procession include faculty marshals (chosen by the graduates), faculty members, deans, honorary degree recipients, and the president of SUNY Downstate.

The academic gown worn by procession members is said to be symbolic of the "democracy of scholarship," for it covers any dress of rank or social standing underneath.

Academic gowns originated in the Middle Ages, the period when universities were beginning to take form. At that time, most scholars were also clerics and therefore dressed as clerics, in long gowns. Over time, the gown became the accepted dress code for scholars: in England, in the second half of the 14th century, for example, several colleges forbade "excess in apparel" and decreed the wearing of long gowns.

The assignment of colors to signify different academic disciplines developed much later, and was standardized in the United States in the late 19th century. In 1895, an intercollegiate commission composed of representatives from leading colleges established a code of academic dress that prescribed cut, style, and materials of the gowns, as well as colors to represent different fields of learning. Today, academic dress code is regulated

by a formal Committee on Academic Costumes and Ceremonies created by the American Council on Education in 1952.

The gown is usually black for all degrees, with variations in the sleeves, the front cut, and trim. The bachelor's degree gown is black with long pointed sleeves. The master's degree gown is black without trim and has oblong sleeves so the upper part of the arm comes through the slit in the sleeve. Doctoral (Ph.D.) gowns are black with bell-shaped sleeves. Mortarboards (caps) with tassels have their own significance. Master's and bachelor's tassels are black, while the Ph.D. tassel may be black or gold; medicine is green.

Hood colors indicate the field of learning: dark blue-philosophy; green-medicine; light blue-education; apricot-nursing; golden yellow-science; white-history; purple-law; dark blue-psychology; salmon-public health; and teal-physical therapy.

Details of academic attire may vary depending on where faculty members completed their degrees. Some foreign degree holders, for example, wear special hats, distinctive to their degree and institution. Whatever the differences, however, the governing tradition is continuity of the academic symbols from the Middle Ages.

I recognize and value human diversity and will provide individualized services for all who seek my care or assistance and respect the rights, values, beliefs, and cultures of those individuals and communities with whom I work.

I will hold as my primary responsibility the health, safety, welfare, and dignity of all human beings.

I will hold in confidence the information shared in the course of my professional service.

I will rely on evidence to support my decisions and actions, and translate that evidence into policies and programs that improve health for all.

I will accept responsibility for my actions and uphold the standards of my profession.

I will actively seek to expand my knowledge and skills as I engage in lifelong learning.

I will add to the body of research and knowledge and share my discoveries.

I will use my experiences to contribute to an improved community and will seek new information and be open to ideas that can better protect and promote the health of individuals in my care and the health of populations.

I will advance health literacy for all and seek equity and justice for vulnerable populations.

My functions and goals are based upon my commitment to the expansion of medical knowledge and the improvement of public health and healthcare for all those in need of the skills of my profession.

I make these commitments freely and with honor.

I do solemnly swear by that which I hold most sacred:

That I will be loyal to the profession of medicine and just and generous to its members;

That I will lead my life and practice my art in uprightness and honor;

That whatever house I shall enter, it shall be for the good of the sick to the utmost of my power;

That I will hold myself aloof from wrong;

That I will exercise my art solely for the cure of my patients, and will give no drug and perform no operation for a wrongful purpose;

That whatsoever I shall see or hear of the lives of men and women that should not be spoken, I will keep secret;

These I do promise, and, in proportion as I am faithful to this my oath, may happiness and good repute be ever mine.
