# American Association of Community Psychiatrists Winter Meeting 2008

Friday and Saturday, February 8 – 9, 2008 9am – 6pm SUNY Downstate Medical Center Alumni Auditorium 395 Lenox Road Brooklyn, NY 11203 The American Association of Community Psychiatrists (AACP) is the nation's largest psychiatric organization committed to promote and provide quality care and to integrate practice with policies that improve the well being of individuals and communities. The 2008 winter meeting of the AACP will be held in Brooklyn, New York, on February 8th and 9th on the campus of the State University of New York Downstate Medical Center (SUNY Downstate) New York City's only public medical school. Co-sponsors include the Federal Center for Mental Health Services Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSHA), the New York State Office of Mental Health (OMH), the New York City Health and Hospitals Corporation (NYCHHC), the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), the Brooklyn Psychiatric Society, and SUNY Downstate.

On Friday, February 8<sup>th</sup>, lectures and panels will address system transformation and recovery. Featured presenters include Kenneth Thompson MD, the Medical Director of SAMSHA, as well as OMH's Commissioner, Michael F. Hogan, PhD, NYS Medical Director, Lloyd Sederer, M.D., Medical Director, Office of Mental Health, State of New York and leaders from NAMI and other parts of the country.

Saturday, February 9<sup>th</sup>, will be devoted to developing participants' ability to use Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) interventions with psychotic patients. After years of considering pharmacological and supportive psychotherapy as the maintenance treatments for schizophrenic and other chronically ill patients, clinicians have begun recognizing the value of the clinician-patient partnership that CBT provides.

Professor Douglas Turkington from the United Kingdom will present on the use of CBT for psychotic disorders-for which he is known internationally, while Professor Michael Garrett, Vice Chair of Psychiatry at SUNY Downstate, together with Dr. Page Burkholder, Medical Director, Chemical Dependency Services at Kings County Hospital Center, will provide a full day introduction to the background and application of CBT, including tapes of patients treated at public psychiatry sites in New York.

#### NEEDS

Both nationally and in New York State, new vocabularies, and new approaches, to working with those with serious mental illnesses have been introduced. "Recovery", "system transformation", "CBT of psychosis" are terms that were rarely used just a few years ago. Evolving concepts of what can be expected as outcomes for those with schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, and other serious and persistent mental illnesses has changed dramatically. Interventions focusing on the reintegration of these patients into social and occupational positions, and of increased expectations of their ability to 'recover' have changed/are changing, the field.

That these developments are at the forefront of the field is demonstrated by the fact that they were the focus of a plenary meeting of the American Association of Chairs of Departments of Psychiatry, the national organization which is comprised of the chairs of all academic departments of psychiatry from around the country. After presentations for the Federal Government and the country's largest consumer organization the topic was opened for discussion. The consensus of this group of senior leaders in academic psychiatry was that they, and their faculty and students, had not been sufficiently exposed to these concepts. This leadership consensus agreed that faculty, practitioners, and indeed, they themselves needed to be educated about these critical areas. This conference, with participation and presentations from Federal, multiple state and consumer perspectives is designed to address those needs.

- Recognize the value of the clinician-patient partnership that CBT provides
- Understand the use and need for CBT
- Understand the treatment models for psychosis
