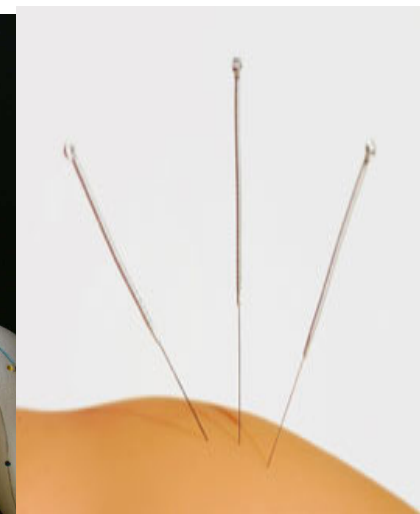
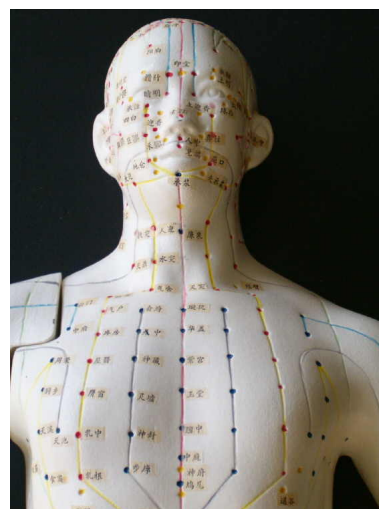

The differential diagnosis for problems such as rheumatic arthritis, carpal tunnel syndrome, periarthritis of shoulders, polyneuritis, brachial plexus neuralgia, Raynaud's disease and many more.
