

Spotlight on Training Sites



Dr. Chow Ng

Residents have the pleasure of spending their time at the St. Albans VA with Dr. Chow Ng. Dr. Ng acts as Section Chief of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at the St. Albans VA Medical Center, bringing a wealth of experience and expertise to her role. With a longstanding passion for education, Dr. Ng plays a key role in the training of our PGY-2 residents all while providing comprehensive rehabilitative care to veterans.

Dr. Ng's journey obtained her Bachelor of Arts degree from Cornell University, followed by a Master of Science in Clinical Nutrition from New York University. She pursued her medical degree education at SUNY Health Science Center in Brooklyn. Dr. Ng then completed her internship in internal medicine at New York Downtown Hospital before completing her residency in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at New York University Rusk Institute of Rehabilitation in 1996.

Throughout her career, Dr. Ng has held various clinical and academic positions, providing her with the experience and expertise in rehabilitation medicine. She has served as an attending physician at St. Joseph's Medical Center in Yonkers and Saint Vincent's Catholic Medical Center in Queens. In these roles, Dr. Ng performed electrodiagnostic studies and delivered comprehensive rehabilitative care, with a focus on both inpatient and outpatient management. She particularly has garnered significant experience in the prescription and management of orthotics, prosthetics, and mobility devices.

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Her commitment to education is evident in her previous roles, which include serving as a director of the rehabilitation division of clinics at Terence Cardinal Cook Health Care Center in NY. Here, she was responsible for providing rehabilitative care for patients in various clinical settings and teaching medical students rotating from Valhalla Westchester Medical School.

Currently, as the Section Chief of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at the St. Albans VA, Dr. Ng oversees patient care at the VA working closely with a multidisciplinary team. She serves as a clinical instructor, supervising Downstate residents and mentoring them in physiatric care across various settings. She is key in teaching PGY-2 residents the fundamentals of EMG/NCS, prosthetic management, and mobility devices. Residents are very fond of her teaching skills as she allows residents to maintain autonomy while still providing them the training they need to be successful.

Dr. Ng's dedication to teaching extends beyond the clinic, as she is passionate about empowering residents with the skills and autonomy to excel in their practice. In her spare time, Dr. Ng enjoys choir, watercolor painting, bicycling, and swimming.

The St. Albans VA Medical Center



Since July 2020, our Downstate PM&R Residency Program has been privileged to include the St. Albans VA Medical Center in Queens as one of our rotation sites. This VA hospital provides an invaluable experience for our PGY-2 residents, offering a comprehensive exposure to both inpatient and outpatient rehabilitation medicine.

Under the guidance of Dr. Ng, our residents spend two enriching months at this site, immersing themselves in the medical complexities associated with the rehabilitation of veterans. One of the highlights of this rotation is the opportunity for our residents to gain their initial exposure in performing EMG and Nerve Conduction Studies.

Dr. Ng works to both teach the basics of the procedure as well as interpretation of the

results. Moreover, the autonomy provided allows residents to tailor their rotation to their individual interests, fostering a dynamic and engaging learning environment.

The St. Albans VA Medical Center is home to both inpatient and subacute rehabilitation patients, providing residents with exposure to a diverse range of clinical settings. Residents actively participate in the management of patients in both settings, honing their skills in both acute and transitional care. This, combined with their outpatient exposure, allows residents to experience the full spectrum of rehabilitative care

One of the unique aspects of training at the VA is the access to government resources, which translates into exposure to specialized wheelchairs, adaptive equipment, and prosthetics. This exposure enhances our residents' understanding of the breadth of rehabilitation options available to veterans. The presence of a dedicated prosthetist on-site facilitates learning in prosthetic management with residents witnessing firsthand the creation of prostheses and adaptive equipment.

The St. Albans VA Medical Center rotation has quickly become a favorite among our residents, thanks to its unique learning opportunities, hands-on experiences, and supportive educational environment. We are grateful for the opportunity to collaborate with the VA in serving our nation's veterans and providing exceptional training to our residents.

St. John's Spotlight

St. John's Episcopal Hospital



St. John's Episcopal Hospital in Far Rockaway, Queens, serves as a crucial rotation site for our residents, offering invaluable training experiences throughout all three years of residency. This site is dedicated to providing both a comprehensive inpatient consultation service as well as an autonomous outpatient clinic. The combination of these two settings ensures our residents develop the skills needed to excel in their future careers as PM&R physicians.

Residents engage in rehabilitation consultations within the hospital, working closely with various specialties to provide physiatry recommendations and disposition plans

for patients. This rotation is integral for residents as it hones their consultation skills from PGY-2 through PGY-4. As the residents progress through their years, they become more confident with how to manage providing recommendations regarding a patient's care, as well as determining which consults require more in-depth analyses. The interdisciplinary collaboration at St. John's enhances residents' ability to offer well-rounded care, ensuring patients receive optimal rehabilitation support. As PGY-3 and PGY-4 residents, our trainees transition to the outpatient PM&R clinic at St. John's. Here, they evaluate and manage a wide array of musculoskeletal and neurological conditions, including joint pains, musculoskeletal injuries, neurologic disorders (such as multiple sclerosis and ALS), prosthetics, orthotics, and chronic pain. The clinic also serves as a training site for performing ultrasound-guided joint injections and EMG/nerve conduction studies.

One of the standout features of the St. John's rotation is the significant autonomy granted to residents in the outpatient clinic. Under the guidance of Dr. Hana Ilan and Dr. Edbert Morales, residents have the flexibility to shape their training according to their interests and career goals, especially in the clinic setting. This empowerment fosters a proactive learning environment, encouraging residents to take initiative and develop their clinical judgment and procedural skills.

The rotation at St. John's Episcopal Hospital emphasizes a collaborative learning environment. Residents work closely with attending physicians and other healthcare professionals, fostering an atmosphere of mutual respect and continuous education. This collaboration ensures that residents are well-prepared to handle diverse clinical scenarios and provide high-quality patient care. We are proud to highlight the exceptional training opportunities available at St. John's under the tutelage of Dr. Hana Ilan and Dr. Edbert Morales. For years, their unwavering dedication to resident education has been a cornerstone of our program.

Dr. Hana Ilan



Dr. Hana Ilan is a distinguished physician and educator who has made significant contributions to our residency here at Downstate. She has been a guiding force to many of our residents throughout the years and has continually provided wisdom and training in many facets of the field of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

Starting her career with a degree in Speech and Language Pathology from City College of the City University of New York, Dr. Ilan worked for many years as a CCC-certified speech and language pathologist before pursuing her medical degree at SUNY Downstate in Brooklyn. She completed her PM&R residency at SUNY Downstate,

where she served as Chief Resident. Her extensive career spans various esteemed institutions, including Long Island Jewish Medical Center, Nassau County Medical Center, Lawrence Nursing Care Center, and the Joseph P. Adabo Family Health Center. Her roles have included Director of Outpatient PM&R, Pediatric Rehabilitation, and Residency Program Director at Nassau County Medical Center from 1988 to 1993.

Currently, Dr. Ilan is the Chairman of the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation and the Site Director for our residents at St. John's Episcopal Hospital. In her role, she provides exceptional education and guidance to residents during bedside consultations, focusing on discharge disposition and interdisciplinary collaboration for musculoskeletal management. In her outpatient clinic, she imparts valuable skills in electromyography, prosthetics/orthotics, and joint injections.

Dr. Ilan's extensive administrative and leadership experience as Chairman of the Department of PM&R and Residency Site Director at a community teaching hospital in Queens, New York, underscores her commitment to graduate medical education. Her prior role as Residency Program Director at a large teaching hospital in Nassau County further highlights her expertise in managing diverse and challenging patient populations while fostering clinical and didactic teaching. Many of our residents pride Dr. Ilan's extensive experience in managing clinical rotations and she constantly provides them with the insight on how to manage their practices. Graduating residents often seek guidance from Dr. Ilan in how to manage the more administrative aspect of physiatry as well as how to properly handle billing and insurance issues.

He provides comprehensive training in electrodiagnosis, joint injections, and the management of both inpatient and outpatient physiatry cases. Dr. Philip Chang



We would like to highlight one of our esteemed alumni, Dr. Philip Chang, DO. Dr. Chang is a physical medicine and rehabilitation physician specializing in cancer rehabilitation. He completed medical school at the Michigan State College of Osteopathic Medicine and then came to SUNY Downstate to complete his residency in physical medicine and rehabilitation. After graduation, Dr. Chang went on to complete a fellowship in hospice and palliative care at Montefiore, followed by a second fellowship in cancer rehabilitation at the University of Michigan. Dr. Chang's research interests include the utility of telemedicine in cancer rehab, the role and benefits of prehabilitation, and precision pain management for

post-mastectomy pain syndrome. He is currently an assistant professor at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center and is the chair of Program Development and Advocacy with the Cancer Rehabilitation Physician Consortium of the American Academy of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. Throughout the years, Dr. Chang has continued to be an educator to the residents at Downstate's PM&R program through multiple lectures and Grand Rounds. He maintains an interest in making sure our residents gain insight into the unique field of cancer rehabilitation and has served as an advisor to some of the residents interested in pursuing a career in cancer rehabilitation.
