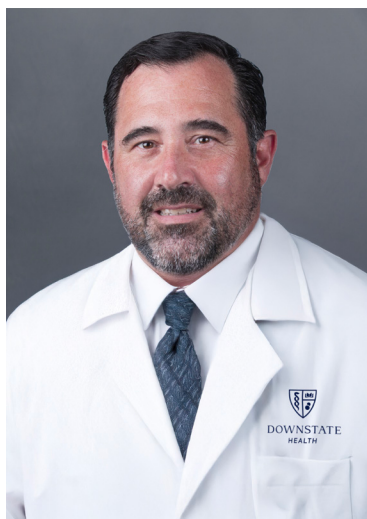
Thank you for being an integral part of our journey. I look forward to celebrating our shared successes and a bright future together at the reception.

MEDICAL STUDENT OUTREACH

Despite its competitive nature, orthopaedic surgery remains a highly sought-after specialty among aspiring physicians. At SUNY Downstate Health Sciences University Department of Orthopaedic Surgery & Rehabilitation Medicine, we have a longstanding tradition of providing robust research opportunities to both students and resident physicians.

Since its introduction in 2021, we have continued our intensive three-day research tutorial. Led by our research coordinator, David Mai, and Adam Wolfert—a class of 2027 resident physician and former tutorial participant—the program was designed to guide participants through the full lifecycle of a research project, from idea conception to scholarly publication. Beyond establishing a strong foundation in research methodologies, the tutorial also equips future leaders with the skills necessary to critically evaluate medical literature. These capabilities further enrich students' understanding of high-yield topics relevant to the USMLE. ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: Dr. Harvinder Sandhu



Harvinder S. Sandhu, MD, MBA, is a world-renowned spine surgeon whose innovative contributions have transformed the field of spine surgery. A distinguished alumnus of Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine, Dr. Sandhu completed his orthopaedic residency at SUNY Downstate before advancing his expertise through a competitive fellowship at the UCLA Health.

Currently serving as Co-Chief Emeritus of HSS Spine, Dr. Sandhu specializes in minimally invasive and robotic spine surgery, as well as biologic enhancement techniques designed to improve spinal fusion outcomes. His leadership extends into academia, where he is a Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery at Weill Cornell Medicine and the Medical Director and Chief of HSS Orthopedics with Stamford Health. These roles underscore his commitment to both advancing surgical care and mentoring the next generation of orthopaedic surgeons.

Dr. Sandhu's career is marked by a prolific research portfolio, with more than 100 peer reviewed publications and several patents in the realm of spinal surgical devices and techniques. His work has garnered prestigious accolades, including the Volvo Award for Lumbar Spine Research and the HSS Andrew N. Swanson Memorial Spine Award for excellence in clinical innovation and education. Additional honors from the Scoliosis Research Society, the North American Spine Society, and the International Society for the Study of the Lumbar Spine further attest to his influential contributions.

Beyond his clinical and academic achievements, Dr. Sandhu is highly active in research, exploring advancements in computer image guided surgery, bone morphogenetic proteins for spinal fusion, and spinal surgery outcomes analysis (with NIH funding). His robust industry relationships with leaders such as Globus Medical and Spine Wave, Inc. help drive the translation of innovative technology into improved patient care.

Dr. Sandhu's career embodies a blend of surgical excellence, innovative research, and dedicated mentorship—qualities that not only define his legacy but also reinforce the enduring impact of SUNY Downstate's rigorous training on the global orthopaedic community.

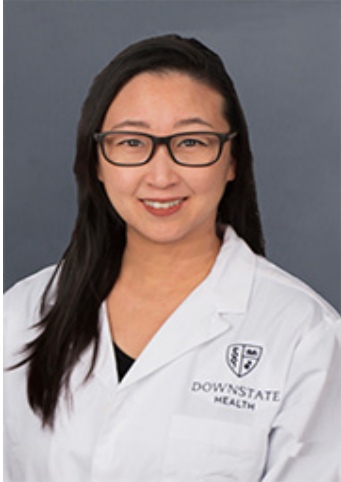
