overview & objectives

As the health care delivery system in the United States becomes increasingly complex, so do the procedures for billing for health care services. This complexity is coupled with dwindling health care funding and insurance reimbursement. Health care providers are faced with many challenges when trying to balance the delivery of cost-effective quality services, while trying to ensure the economic survival of their practices.
