NEW HOME FOR THE SPH

The School of Public Health has recently expanded into our new, state-of-the- art Public Health Academic Building for the Fall 2018 term. The building, designed by Ennead Architects, contains office space for faculty, staff, and graduate students, common lounge areas, conference rooms, classrooms, and event space. It will also contain open-plan research laboratories, a state-of-the-art clinical simulation center, and multi-function spaces designed to accommodate team-based learning. Situated between the Basic Sciences Building (BSB) and Clarkson Avenue, the new building's entrance plaza will open into an expansive lobby serving both buildings.


FACULTY HONORED WITH PRESTIGIOUS AWARDS

STUDENTS AND FACULTY REPRESENT DOWNSTATE AT APHA CONFERENCE


A number of Downstate SPH faculty and students were selected to present at the American Public Health Association (APHA) Annual Meeting and Expo on November 10-14, 2018. MPH student, Mahlaga Butt, gave a talk, "Low-dose ketamine versus morphine to severe pain in the Emergency Department geriatric population: A prospective, randomized, double-blind study;" MPH student Antara Afrin, on behalf of classmates Yasmeen Mohammad, Khady Ndiaye, and Brandon Yarde, presented a poster entitled, "Barriers and enablers of healthy food access among low-income Afro-Caribbeans in Crown Heights, Brooklyn;" DrPH student, Chanee Massiah, presented a poster called, "Factors associated with periodontal disease in a sample of Afro-Caribbean patients from a dental practice in Brooklyn, NY." DrPH student, Bianca Rivera taught a class called "Epidemiology for Non-Epidemiologists" with Dr. Simone Reynolds. MPH students, Alyson Clarke, Tasnim Ahmad, and Maya Lloyd (on behalf of classmates Beverly Chang and Brittany Daughtry), presented a poster entitled, "Health disparities in gentrified communities: The ongoing fight for health equality and social justice of minority residents in Harlem."
