
Concentration in Community Health Sciences

What brought you to the field of Public Health?

This experience allows me to apply knowledge from my MPH courses of program planning, evaluation, and statistical analyses to real life settings. In particular, I have learned the importance of culturally tailoring interventions for diverse ethnic groups. The work from REACH FAR has been especially important to me since it aligns with my career interests and passion in understanding and alleviating health disparities within Asian communities and it has inspired the topic for my Master's Thesis.
