Speakers: Dr. Josie Méndez-Negrete, Veronica Castillo, Dr. Rosie Hurtado

Enjoy both an analysis of Sor Juana's life, as well as a reading of some of her most Internationally renowned ceramicist Veronica Castillo alongside Professor Emerita and Independent Publisher Dr. Josie Méndez-Negrete will officially launch their co-authored book, Rooted in Clay: El Arte de Verónica Castillo. This book is written as a plática in which Castillo shares her life work, inspiration, politics, and history with Méndez-Negrete alongside images of her sculptures and experiences that led her to be one of the first artist requested to submit work for the newly launched Latino Heritage Museum for the Smithsonian Institute in Washington DC.

This event will allow these guests to speak directly with students about the process of creating such a book, the politics of such a book, and the importance of shifting consciousness regarding what constitutes fine art in the United States.
